




Most Years 7-9 students only consider university

What do you think you might like to do when you finish school? (multiple response)








Parents and students see an inequality in pathway celebration










VCE Honour Roll 2023

Find out how many 40+ scores your school attained and in which subjects






Top 20 public and private schools for VCE


Repositioning what we value

Review into vocational and applied learning pathways for senior secondary students (the Firth Review) set the agenda to transform senior secondary education by:

2. Helping more students access high-quality applied learning programs

3. Providing a vocational pathway that gives students the skills they need to move successfully into further training and jobs post-school


Enrolments up 8% in 2023 to 25,200 across all school sectors

For Glenroy College student Ellan Youkhana, year 12 results day is not just about receiving an ATAR but a chance to reflect on how far he's come since his family fled war-torn Syria. The 18-year-old is one of more than 50,000 school leavers who planned to gather around their devices on Monday morning to see if their hard work paid off. Mr Youkhana's high school journey was far fom

ordinary, having to overcome language barriers, bullying and childhood trauma to become the first person in his family to attain a VCE. His family moved to Melbourne in 2017. Prior to this he survived being held hostage by ISIS for more than a year, bombs raining down on his family's village and his home being set alight by the extremist group. When he first set foot in a **Glenroy College classroom** as a year 7 student, Mr Youkhana knew

basic English and had missed three years of primary school. "I focused on my education despite some people saying I didn't know English – they used to laugh," he said. "Look at me now, I've graduated. This is a big achievement for me and I finished year 12 without mea subject, and I gota architecture at RMIT," he said. "When I was younger I always wanted to be an architect."






Industry and community connections P-12



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
